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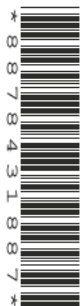

- the ways in which the poet portrays the forest
- the effect on you of the final question.

- 2 Read carefully the following extract from a novel. The driver of a car travelling along a mountain road loses control, and the car tips onto its side. Mrs Betteson, another passenger, helps a teenage girl to escape by pushing her out of the car door. The girl, who wears glasses, falls down a steep slope.

How does the writer make the girl's experience so vivid?

To help you answer this question, you might consider:

- how he describes the moment when the girl is caught on the handle of the car door
- how he describes what the girl sees and hears
- how he conveys the importance of the spectacles to the girl.

After Mrs Betteson had pushed the girl out of the car and had begun to fall out herself, she hung for a hideous moment hooked by the old-fashioned glacé¹ leather belt of her dress to the handle of the door.

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The spectacles lay on the sand, unbroken,
and it seemed to her that a miracle had happened.

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
