- (a) Explain why Louis XVI recalled the Parlements at the start of his reign in 1774. [10]
- (b) To what extent did internal divisions cause the counter-revolutionaries to fail in the period from 1790 to 1795? [20]

2 Liberalism and nationalism in Germany, 1815–71

- (a) Explain why the Treaty of Prague, 1866, increased Prussia's power in Germany. [10]
- (b) 'The humiliation of Olmütz weakened German nationalism.' How far do you agree? [20]

3 The Russian Revolution, 1894–1921

- (a) Explain why the Kronstadt rebellion of 1921 happened. [10]
- (b) 'The opposition to the Tsarist regime in the period from 1906 to 1914 was **not** a serious threat.' How far do you agree? [20]

- (a) Explain why the Republican Party grew rapidly after its foundation in 1854. [10]

- (a) Explain why foreign powers had an impact on the Civil War. [10]
- (b) 'Grant's reconstruction policies failed.' How far do you agree? [20]

- (b) 'The Progressive Movement failed to improve the lives of ordinary Americans.' How far do you agree? [20]

- (a) Explain why the United States began an extensive modernisation of its navy in the late nineteenth century. [10]
