Generic Marking Principles

These general marking principles must be applied by all examiners when marking candidate answers. They should be applied alongside the specific content of the mark scheme or generic level descriptions for a question. Each question paper and mark scheme will also comply with these marking principles.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 1:

Marks must be awarded in line with:

- the specific content of the mark scheme or the generic level descriptors for the question
- the specific skills defined in the mark scheme or in the generic level descriptors for the question
- the standard of response required by a candidate as exemplified by the standardisation scripts.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 2:

Marks awarded are always **whole marks** (not half marks, or other fractions).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 3:

Marks must be awarded **positively**:

- marks are awarded for correct/valid answers, as defined in the mark scheme. However, credit is given for valid answers which go beyond the scope of the syllabus and mark scheme, referring to your Team Leader as appropriate
- marks are awarded when candidates clearly demonstrate what they know and can do
- marks are not deducted for errors
- marks are not deducted for omissions
- answers should only be judged on the quality of spelling, punctuation and grammar when these features are specifically assessed by the question as indicated by the mark scheme. The meaning, however, should be unambiguous.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 4:

Rules must be applied consistently, e.g. in situations where candidates have not followed instructions or in the application of generic level descriptors.

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 5:

Marks should be awarded using the full range of marks defined in the mark scheme for the question (however; the use of the full mark range may be limited according to the quality of the candidate responses seen).

GENERIC MARKING PRINCIPLE 6:

Marks awarded are based solely on the requirements as defined in the mark scheme. Marks should not be awarded with grade thresholds or grade descriptors in mind.

Annotations guidance for centres

Examiners use a system of annotations as a shorthand for communicating their marking decisions to one another. Examiners are trained during the standardisation process on how and when to use annotations. The purpose of annotations is to inform the standardisation and monitoring processes and guide the supervising examiners when they are checking the work of examiners within their team. The meaning of annotations and how they are used is specific to each component and is understood by all examiners who mark the component.

We publish annotations in our mark schemes to help centres understand the annotations they may see on copies of scripts. Note that there may not be a direct correlation between the number of annotations on a script and the mark awarded. Similarly, the use of an annotation may not be an indication of the quality of the response.

5	Six from: - To determine if the new system meets the user / system / design specifications – set out by the analysts / designers (at the start of development) to determine any limitations / functions (that were in the specifications) – but cannot be carried out / are not fully working / producing unexpected / unwanted results - To determine if it is working / behaving overall as expected / designed to do - To determine if end-users are able to access / use it as required – so the database is easy to use / user-friendly – so makes the jobs of end-users easier / more difficult - To show if the system has any problems / expose any problems / shortcomings / errors – to determine how / if these affect its working / use – to determine / show opportunities / areas for future developer / programmers to add features / functions	6

7	Eight from: Command word: Discuss – write about issues(s) or topic(s) in a structured way. Max one from: <i>Definition of virtual currency:</i> • A virtual currency represents an amount of money that is stored only in digital form • Can be represented by coupons / stamps / reward points Max five from: <i>Advantages:</i> • Use of cryptography during transactions increases security • Not regulated so value can change hands without oversight (1st) – with no records available to regulators (1) • Issuing company has a captive market • Goods / services can only be purchased from that company • Value stays the same when used in different countries • Transactions are faster than with physical currency Max five from: <i>Disadvantages:</i> • Use is restricted to members of specific (virtual) group / community / game environment that agree to use it • No connection to the real-world economy / no interchangeability with real currency • No intrinsic value / value because it depends on agreement between users / group / community / game environment • Not regulated so value depends on trust between users • Value can fluctuate widely as not regulated so can lose / gain money	8

8(b)	Four from: - Identify / log / record risk - Use a risk matrix - Assign risk to a category e.g. high / medium / low or catastrophic, critical, marginal or negligible / suitable scale - Assign likelihood of disaster / suitable scale e.g. likely / possible / unlikely - Assign monetary cost to risk / use cost of risk prevention / recovery as scale - Collect expert opinion on level of risk - Experts assign value (e.g. 1 to 10 to aspect of risk) - Combine vales to give overall vale / level - Compare risk with other known risks	4

9(a)	Three from: - Use of DHCP server (in the network) - NIC looks for a DHCP server - Using UDP (to communicate) - Sends a (dhcpdiscover) request on network (as it connects) - Server sends (dhcpoffer) / offers NIC an IP address - NIC sends (dhcprequest) and accepts IP address - Server acknowledges / sends ACK response with details of IP address (and other parameters).	3
9(b)	Four from: - Uniquely identifies NIC / device on the network - Has two parts identifying the network <u>and</u> the specific device / network address and device address - Destination / source IP address is in the packets (1st) in the header (1) - NIC recognises packet with its IP address (1st) it receives it / passes it to / up network stack of device for processing (1) discards / ignores all other packets (1) - Used by routers to send packets between devices on other networks / in routing of packets.	4

11	Eight from: Command word: Evaluate: judge or calculate the quality, importance, amount, or value of something. Max eight from: <i>Content areas could include e.g.:</i> • Distribution of useful information to citizens e.g. mass mailings – so can reach many citizens efficiently / quickly – but not all have email addresses / accounts – so not all receive the information • Updating of regulations – to targeted individuals / organisations • Advice and discussions on current issues – government news – feedback from citizens • Tracking of citizens – monitoring citizens emails – infringement of privacy / rights of citizens – tracking illegal activities • Sending false / distorted / biased information – dissemination of government views Max one from: Conclusion: • One mark for a reasoned conclusion / overall judgement	8
